A FRIEND OF + POSSESSIVE is used as an idiomatic expression to mean that the person is your friend, but not your ONLY friend. "A friend of mine" means "one of my many friends".

Study these examples below:

Jack ate lunch with <u>his friend</u> .	Jack ate lunch with <u>a friend of his</u> .
Max is <u>my friend</u> .	Max is <u>a friend of mine</u> .
Sam has a friend. I ate dinner with <u>Sam's friend</u> .	I ate dinner with <u>a friend of Sam's</u> .
